the date of Easter is related to the full Moon? Specifically, Easter is celebrated on the first Sunday after the paschal full Moon on or just after the vernal equinox. For simplicity, the equinox is considered to be March 2I (a fixed date set by the Church), although in astronomy, it's not always that day. The paschal full Moon always falls on the 14th

Would you believe that day of a lunar month; because ancient calculation (made in AD 325) did not take into account certain lunar motions, it may differ from the actual full Moon date by a day or so. Easter always falls on a Sunday between March 22 and April 25.

> Eggs, traditionally forbidden during Lent, symbolize new life. The Easter Bunny recalls the

hare, the Egyptian symbol of fertility.

The origin of the word "Easter" is unclear. It may have derived its name from the Anglo Saxon dawn goddess Eostre, whose feast was celebrated each spring at about his time. Or, it may have derived from words meaning "rising," "dawn," or "east."
